

roof of my car when I go through a yellow light so that I won't get a ticket. This is a Moose Jaw tradition and I've done it since high school."

Atchison -

very bad luck to have my picture on the internet."

Mme. Campbell: "I'm not really



superstitious. My mother thought- she believed - that you should burn the hair you lose and not throw it in the garbage."

luck, and bad luck... but I believe you have to put yourself out there in order to have luck. You've got to take chances."


Are you in NEED of something FUN to do?



Gender 101

We are back with another much needed segment of "Gender 101" - the section of the paper where you learn more and become a more inclusive individual!


Did you know?

There are a lot of different gender identities. People can identify as male, female, nonbinary, trans, gender fluid, two-spirit, demiboy, demi-girl, and agender which we discussed in a previous newspaper. Here are some important terms we should all understand:

Cis male: a person who was assigned male at birth and self identifies as male and uses he/him pronouns.

Cis female: a person who was assigned female at birth and self identifies as female and uses she/her pronouns.

Non-binary: a person who doesn't identify as the gender they were assigned at birth or the opposite gender they often go by they/them pronouns.



Trans: a person who doesn't identify with the gender they were assigned at birth and wants to identify with the opposite gender (you should be respectful of their pronouns and ask what are the proper pronouns they use).

Gender fluid: a person who identifies with all genders, they could be male one minute and then female the next hour, then nonbinary half an hour later, if you don't feel like asking their pronouns all the time you could use they/them with no issue but it is always acceptable to ask what pronouns to use.

Two-spirit: refers to a person who identifies as having both a masculine and a feminine spirit, and is used by some Indigenous peoples to describe their sexual, gender and/or spiritual identity.

Demi-boy: a person who feels comfortable with the gender male but also non-binary, they usually use he/they pronouns.

Demi-girl: a person who feels comfortable with the gender female but also non-binary, they usually use she/they pronouns.

Other equally important information:


 March 8th was International Women's Day! International Women's Day was marked for the first time in March 1911. • **November 19th** is International Men's day. International men's day began in 1992.

There is no one way to express your gender. Gender expression is how a person publicly expresses or presents their gender. It can include outward appearance, like dresses, pants, suits, ties, skirts, hoodies, makeup, hair and more. It can also be behavior like body language and voice. A person's name and pronouns are other ways a person can express their gender.

Gender vs sex

There is a difference between gender and sex. Sex is defined by the biological traits of male and female reproductive orgens, and the XX or XY chromosome, and the abundance of certain hormones.

Gender is defined by social norms and roles placed on people.
